

Ethics and social responsibility in research – An introductory course

“A competent academic knows and complies with guidelines for responsible conduct of research. He/she can also discuss and justify ethical and social questions arising from his/her research, and observe and identify ethical challenges in personal research agenda as well as in research as a social activity. This introductory course provides young academics knowledge of the responsible conduct of research guidelines. The course will also help the participants engage with concepts and practice to analyse research from a social and ethical perspectives. This will equip participants with skills to manage their research agenda in the wider social context. The course is built using independent e-learning as well as collaborative learning workshops.”

So what does all that mean in practice? This course outline should answer most of your questions about course structure, expectations, workload, materials and where to get help. So keep reading.

Course structure

This introductory course is divided into five components:

Component	Approximate workload

Independent e-learning

Prior to collaborative workshops you are expected to read an article ‘Making Good Decisions’ outlining basic ethical theory for decision-making using research-based examples. This article is supported by recorded lectures.

On the course website you will also find an ‘Ethical Theory’ Discussion Area, which is your forum to ask questions regarding the theoretical base outlined in the article and lectures. The better you understand the theory prior to the collaborative workshops, the more you will enjoy and benefit from them.

Pre-workshop assignment

By 23rd of January 2012 you are expected to post your most challenging ethical/social research challenge to date on the 'Ethical challenge' discussion area. This posting should be about 1-2 pages long and include enough detail for others to be able to place the challenge in context. It may be helpful to include a short description of your research project with your posting – even your formal research plan as an attachment.

Collaborative learning workshop

The two-days we spend together are structured around working together as opposed to you listening to a talking head (you already had that experience from the online lectures). There will be short lecture sessions on theory, but most of the workshop is spent on working on challenges and applying theory in a meaningful way. This structure is chosen as research suggests listening is the worst form of learning when you measure it by what the students can remember after a few months. On the other hand discussing and teaching others results in the best learning outcome. Also, the questions on ethics and social responsibility are by their nature ambiguous and a discussion approach is a natural way of learning.

The workshop activities will focus on the key research ethics and social responsibility themes. The actual programme is open to change based on specific questions and outcomes from pre-workshop collaboration.

Day 1

- Theory block based on pre-workshop material and assignments
- Ethical questions in research funding
- Ethical questions of evaluating research
- Social responsibility of research

Day 2

- Ethical questions in research publication
- Research ethics legislation and codes of conduct
- Meaning of research
- Supervision and personal ethical challenges

Group work

Between the two workshop days you are expected to work on a practical assignment in small groups allocated in the workshop. The assignment will require you to make decisions on an ethical matter and produce an outcome, which will be incorporated as part of Day 2 workshop. The group can choose to meet either in person or utilising the shared online learning space.

Final assignment

After the workshops you are expected to submit a 4 page (approx. 2000 words in English) essay outlining what you think is the most important ethical challenge either in your own research or in your field, and suggest a reasoned solution to it. This assignment is due 29th February 2012. Please submit your assignment by email to henriikka.clarkeburn@gmail.com.

Passing the course

The course will be marked using pass/fail. In order to pass you need to complete all course components satisfactorily, including attendance at the workshops. If unsatisfactory work is submitted, a re-submission is requested.
